Transcript 3.1

Podcast Host: Our next guest on this episode of Cyber Inspire is Ida Stanton. She is an amazing young lady who has worked through all of life's difficulties and achieved her goals. She's a senior at Ohio State University and a scholar of the National Association for the Education of Homeless Children and Youth. Ida was homeless many times over her life, yet she never quit. We'll ask Ida about her life as a homeless girl and how she was motivated to work with homeless youth. Welcome, Ida. So, can you tell us a bit about yourself?

Ida: Hi, thanks for having me here today. Yes, I've been homeless on and off since the age of four. To begin with, our father died when I was three. Soon after his death, we moved to Waco to be with the rest of our family. We stayed with our relatives

for some time. My mum had to work long hours while my sister was babysitting me. Later, the family we were living with had twin babies, so there was no room left for us. After that, we moved to many shelters and other safe places. When mum found

out that she was diabetic, I was in 4th grade. Her health was mostly unstable after that, and she couldn't hold any of her jobs. In the end, I had to relocate and attend a new school every time my mother got a new job.

Podcast Host: How did this situation affect your education?

Ida: Moving from one school to another made me fall behind the other students. While I was looking for support for my education, I met the Homeless Education Assistance Act. This service helped me to stay at the same school despite my housing problems. I'm in college now and planning to go so much further.

Podcast Host: Why do you want to help other homeless children and youth?

Ida: My experiences led me to help other homeless young people. Last year, I took part in a briefing on homeless children and youth that was held in the parliament. I also became the leader of the homeless children while I was coordinating the Youth Task Force.
